Holy Habits

Our Holy Habit for January and February is **PRAYER**. We will start with our annual covenant prayer on January 5th followed by these morning services:

Reflecting on the Lord's Prayer

The Lord's Prayer has shaped the lives of Jesus' followers ever since he first taught it to his disciples. Rooted in Jesus' relationship to the Father, the prayer encompasses the whole of life, inviting us to pray for God's presence and power to change the world and to change us.

The Lord's Prayer is found in two versions in the New Testament (Matthew 6:9-13; Luke 11:2-4). In Matthew's Gospel, it sits alongside Jesus' teaching on giving and fasting, while in Luke's Gospel, it is followed by Jesus' teaching on the importance of persistence and faith in prayer. Although Luke's shorter version may be closer to Jesus' original prayer, Matthew's longer version fills out the details and is closest to that used in churches today.

For those familiar with the Lord's Prayer, it is easy to rush through the words without always grasping what they mean. Methodist Church has produced a short guide which briefly explores its meaning and offers these prompts for praying:

"Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy Name" Recall that you are in the presence of a God who is your Father but also the ruler of all. Dwell on the gift of God's presence with you.

"Thy kingdom come; thy will be done; on earth as it is in heaven" Bring your prayers for others to mind. You might pray through the various 'circles' of your lives: your close relationships (family and friends); your neighbourhood; your workplace; your country; the world.

"Give us this day our daily bread" Bring to God your physical needs - food, shelter, work - as well as your spiritual needs.

"And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us" Ask for God's forgiveness in those areas in which you fall short of the call to love God and love others.

"And lead us not into temptation: but deliver us from evil" Know that God is present in the struggle and temptations of life. God will give the grace to survive the trials that come your way

"For thine is the kingdom, the power, and the glory" Give thanks that God is ultimately in control, and that - however mysterious - God can bring good out of evil, hope out of adversity, and life out of death (Romans 4:17).

"For ever and ever. Amen"

Fairtrade

On Sunday 9th February our locally arranged morning service will be considering Fairtrade Fortnight which runs from 24 February to 8 March. It may be hard to swallow but many of the people behind our most-loved food still live in extreme poverty. The organisers of Fairtrade continue with their mission to ensure that all farmers are paid fairly for their work and are able to earn a living income, starting with cocoa farmers in West Africa.



Cocoa Farmers

£1.86* is the amount a cocoa farmer in West Africa needs to earn each day in order to achieve a living income. Currently, a typical cocoa farmer in Cote d'Ivoire lives on around 74p** a day. Almost all cocoa farmers in West Africa live in poverty.

For the women the situation is even worse. They may plant and harvest on the farm, look after children, carry water, collect wood, cook and clean for the family, and transport the cocoa beans to market but often with fewer rights than men.

This is why Fairtrade are campaigning for a living income to become a reality for cocoa farmers in West Africa. If they can work together with governments, chocolate companies and retailers to make the commitments and policies necessary, then they can make it happen.

On 7 August 2019, Ivorian Independence Day, Fairtrade campaigners joined Fairtrade Foundation staff at 10 Downing Street to hand in a petition with more than 50,000 signatures calling for Boris Johnson to back cocoa farmers fighting for a fairer deal through UK-funded aid projects, business and human rights legislation, and joining international efforts that unite governments, chocolate companies and civil society to achieve living incomes.

What is a living income? A living income means enough money to live a simple but dignified life, paying for essentials such as clothing, medicine and school. We believe this is not a luxury but a human right.

Choose Fairtrade Chocolate

Perhaps one of the simplest ways to support cocoa farmers around the world, is by buying Fairtrade chocolate and cocoa. While this doesn't immediately solve all the issues, keeping up the demand allows farmers to sell more of their cocoa on Fairtrade terms thus increasing their income.



Maltesers Many of us love these honeycomb-centred balls of yumminess. And they're available almost everywhere! Look for the Fairtrade Mark.

Marks and Spencer M&S has a selection of Fairtrade chocolate including their Single Origin range.

Co-op In May 2017 Co-op became the first UK retailer to source all its cocoa on Fairtrade terms, so all of Co-op's own-brand products which contain cocoa - from the chocolate sprinkles on their doughnuts to the chocolate chips in their cookies - are benefitting Fairtrade cocoa farmers. If you fancy drinking your chocolate, the Co-op own brand drinking chocolate is also Fairtrade.
