Dear friends



A Statement from the Leadership Team

We know that some of you are disappointed that Dore Methodist Church is not as yet open for worship, but there are also others who do not feel it is appropriate for them to consider returning at the present time. We thought it might be helpful to explain what the Leadership Team has had to undertake during the last eight months, and this might help people understand the decisions that have been taken. At the heart of our deliberations and decisions has been the health and well being of our members, to whom we have a duty of care.

The Leadership Team have met regularly by Zoom (video conferencing). Three members of the team have visited the building weekly to perform certain tasks to satisfy the requirements of our Insurance company. In July the Government and Methodist Church issued guidelines for re-opening churches and we started to plan what we were required to do to make our building Covid secure. The Methodist Church asked that we consult with our members to gauge their views on returning to worship and we sent out our questionnaire to everyone. The responses did not indicate an overwhelming desire to return to worship as soon as possible, and this view influenced the speed our future actions.

Our first major task was to prepare a comprehensive Risk Assessment, following the strict guidelines set out by the Methodist Church. This resulted in a 12-page document which needed to be approved by both the Circuit and our Church Council, which met on 10th September specifically for this purpose. At this time we were working towards two trial mid-week services at the end of October. We had already planned for the Hall to be redecorated and this was completed by the second week in September. Following on from this work we arranged for the carpet in the Hall to be cleaned early in October. At the same time we were sourcing all the necessary personal protection equipment and consumables that we would need to meet the requirements of our risk assessment. Obviously following the redecoration, and the fact that the building had not been cleaned since March, a "Deep Clean" was required. Due to personal circumstances our Cleaner had been granted compassionate leave, so we needed to employ a Cleaning Company to undertake this work. We also needed to carry out checks on our fire alarm system and unexpectedly these failed, and we have needed to undertake extensive and expensive work to rectify the defects.

As we were getting near to the planned dates of our first trial services and being able to issue details of the practicalities of these, the coronavirus situation locally deteriorated and Sheffield moved into Tier 3. In the light of this, and the fact that we had not already opened for worship, we felt that it would be inappropriate to continue with these plans. A few days after we had made this decision both the Circuit and District asked churches to seriously review their situations and the Chair of the Sheffield District, Rev Gill Newton, specifically said *"For those parts of the District that find yourselves under Tier 3 restrictions, I urge you to think very carefully about whether it is now appropriate for churches to remain open, given the rising infection rates your communities are experiencing. We have a duty of care to one another and to those alongside whom we live and work." Subsequently we have moved into a further period of national lockdown with all places of worship now closed for corporate worship.*

We hope that this statement outlines the efforts that have been taken to enable worship to restart in our building. These preparations will not be in vain and as soon as some restrictions are lifted and we feel that it would be appropriate to organise acts of worship we will do so, in accordance with the guidance appropriate at that time. We hope and pray that it will be possible for us to celebrate Advent and Christmas by worshipping together in our building, even if not quite in the same way as we have done in previous years. We will, of course also continue to supply to all our congregation a weekly act of worship, as we have done since the first Sunday of lockdown in March.

Margaret was an active lively-minded person with many interests. She enjoyed reading the newspapers and to the end she knew what was going on around her in the world and locally. She and her father loved to discuss politics and put the world to rights.

The heart of Margaret's life though, was the church. She went to Peter Street Methodist Church until it was closed. On Sundays her mother made sure she went to church three times, one being an afternoon Sunday school. She enjoyed bring in the Girls' Life Brigade where she made several very good lifelong friends and was part of the team that went to dance on the stage at the Royal Albert Hall when they were in the finals of an all England country dance team.

Her next church was Trinity Methodist at Page Hall where she and George were married. Once again here she was an active member before finally moving to Dore.

After retirement Margaret was able to pursue some of her many interests at leisure. Travelling had always been a favourite and she and George enjoyed many cruises and holidays. They also enjoyed closer to home many walks in her beloved Peak District and were often joined by friends Barry and Shirley. Another of her enjoyments was attending the philharmonic concerts at the City Hall and it was only a couple of years ago she stopped going when she gave up night time outings.

The garden was a great source of joy to Margaret and her family, marvelled at the wonderful display that blossomed in her border each autumn and it was in her garden, that she and Mary celebrated their 80th birthdays with a sit down meal with friends.

The family described "Aunty" Margaret as a legend! She became both a great and a great, great aunt and they all have so many memories of her and stories to tell. She will be greatly missed.


Some Good News

Grace Food Bank A Summary of the 2019-2020 Annual Report

During the past year over 35 tonnes of food was donated to the food bank. The estimated value was £61,824. Food parcels were provided to feed 2124 adults and 1008 children, an increase of 5% over the previous year. 80% of people who were helped last year received 3 food parcels or fewer, 12% received 4-6 parcels (typically people making a new

claim for Universal Credit) and a very small number received 10 or more parcels (people unable to claim benefits).

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Clients usually receive parcels at weekly intervals (a single person may receive one parcel a fortnight). The standard set of food parcels will feed two people for one week and the size of parcels is adjusted to fit the size of the family. Other things like nappies and baby food are provided along with parcels that suit different medical or religious dietary needs (Halal, gluten free, lactose free etc).

Over the school holidays the food bank put on events that included food and children's activities. There were only 3 days across the 5-week summer holidays when nothing took place. At these events the food bank provided family friendly recipe packs for people to take home and prepare. Each pack made a meal to feed at least 4 people. Across the school holidays, 410 recipe packs were given out.

About 25 churches, several local schools, local mosques and a number of community groups, sports clubs and workplaces collect food to give to the food bank. Also, there are permanent collection points at Sainsbury's, Archer Road, Morrison's on Meadowhead, Tesco and Tesco Express.

Fortunately, during the COVID-19 pandemic the food bank continues to help those people most in need. Our contribution, however modest, is vitally important at this time.

Food Bank Christmas Appeal

The next two collections (November 16th and 30th) will be for the Christmas Wishlist. It is an opportunity to share our traditional Christmas food with others.

Boxes of Christmas biscuits, medium or small, not large tins

Small Christmas Cakes or packs of Christmas Mini rolls etc

Chocolates/sweets in medium sized boxes, anything that looks festive

Selection boxes/chocolate coins

Pringles, cheddars or similar crisps in a cardboard tube

Bottles of fizzy grape juice or similar

Tins of Salmon Tins of Ham

Sachets of instant custard

Small boxes of crackers/biscuits for cheese



Boxes of Mince Pies (without brandy). These often have a short shelf life

None of Them Are Toys!




